INTRODUCTION

In compliance with the Head Start Performance Standard 1302, a comprehensive community assessment was completed under the direction of the MAAC Child Development Program (CDP). Demographic data was collected from a variety of sources, current enrollment data was gathered, parent and staff surveys were completed and meetings with community partners were conducted for the purpose of developing program goals and updating program plans and policies for Head Start and Early Head Start programs across North San Diego County—nine (9) MAAC Centers in the North Coastal area, eight (8) MAAC Centers in the North Inland area, six (6) Partner Centers located in Escondido, Oceanside, San Marcos and Vista and 19 Family Child Care Program (FCCP) homes located throughout North San Diego County.

PROCESS

Community Data

A variety of internal and external sources were used to gather data on the demographic makeup of Head Start and Early Head Start eligible children and families in North San Diego County and the general service areas of MAAC, Partner and FCCP centers.

Population, childcare, disability, health and education data were collected from the California Department of Finance, U.S. Census Bureau, California Department of Education, California Community Care Licensing Division, California Child Care Resource & Referral Network, State of California Employment Development Department, County of San Diego and other similar sources.

Additional child and family data collected at enrollment and entered into ChildPlus—a widely-used program management software for Head Start and Early Head Start—was included in this report.

Parent Survey

Input from parents with a child currently enrolled in a Head Start/Early Head Start program in North San Diego County was an essential part of the comprehensive community assessment process. The information gathered from parents provided direction for the development and maintenance of services to meet the needs of eligible children and their families in North San Diego County.

Previous community assessment survey questions and the Head Start Performance Standard 1302 guided the development of the parent survey.

The purpose of conducting the parent survey was to better understand the needs of eligible children and families in regard to...

- Head Start/Early Head Start program options
- Family and household assistance/service needs
- Food and nutrition assistance/service needs
- Employment challenges
- Family engagement activities
- Parenting needs
- Community concerns and challenges
- Respondent and family information

Parent surveys were distributed in mid-January 2018 to parents with a child currently enrolled in a Head Start or Early Head Start program. Surveys were collected from parents until mid-February. A total of 1,498 parents of the 1,783 children enrolled in a Head Start/Early Head Start program in North San Diego County completed a parent survey.

Staff Survey

Staff members at MAAC Head Start and Early Head Start centers throughout North San Diego County were also included in the assessment process. Staff members were asked for their perspective on key community issues and needs, their knowledge, use and accessibility of available resources for the individuals and families that they serve and their suggestions for improving services.

A request via email was sent to all staff in late January to complete an online survey. A total of 86 staff members responded to the survey with input regarding the following:

- Family and household assistance/services
- Food and nutrition assistance/services
- Health and mental health assistance/services
- Parenting assistance/services
- Community issues and assistance/services

Specifically, Head Start/Early Head Start staff were asked to indicate which assistance/services are of key importance to individuals and families at their center and whether their center or other local providers offered such assistance/services or if there is a lack of providers for such assistance/services in North San Diego County. Staff members were also asked to indicate the community issues of key concern to the individuals and families they serve and any suggestions for addressing such issues.

Community Partners Focus Groups

To further understand the complex and diverse needs of the children and families throughout North San Diego County, MAAC invited local community agencies and key stakeholders to participate in a focus group session to share their opinions regarding the family, nutrition, health, mental health, parenting, educational, employment and social service needs of individuals and families that they serve. The focus groups also provided an opportunity to facilitate community linkages and partnerships.

Two Community Partner Focus Group sessions were held at the MAAC Child Development Administration office in San Marcos, California on February 28, 2018. The focus group sessions included MAAC leaders and staff, parents, and representatives from the following local agencies:

The focus group discussions covered the following topic areas:

- Family and Household assistance/services
- Food and Nutrition assistance/services
- Parent assistance/services
- Health assistance and services
- Mental Health assistance and services
- Employment assistance and services
- Educational programs and services
- Community issues, assistance and services

For each topic area, focus group participants were asked to share about the types of assistance and service of greatest importance to the individuals or families that they serve.

With an idea about some of the services that are of key importance to families, focus group participants were asked whether their organizations provided any of the needed services, if they referred individuals or families to other providers or if they felt there is a lack of such services throughout North San Diego County.

Report Notes

Secondary demographic data was gathered for each of the cities where MAAC Head Start/Early Head Start Centers, Partner Centers and Family Child Care Program (FCCP) homes are located. Cities were then grouped to make up the North Coastal and North Inland areas (see table below). The two areas were then combined to form North San Diego County.

General Demographics

Population

- North San Diego County had total population of 681,525 in 2016, less than a 1% increase from 2015.
- The North Coastal area had a 2016 population of 422,834, accounting for 60% of North San Diego County's population.
- In 2016, the total population in the North Inland area was 258,691.
- In 2016, as in 2015, 7% of North San Diego County's population was made up of persons under 5 years of age, resulting in a median age of 36 years-old
- In the North Coastal and North Inland areas, 7% of each area's population was under 5 years-old.

- 47% of the population in North San Diego County in 2016 was White alone, which was higher than the 38% estimated across California.
- The percentage of the population in North San Diego County that was Asian alone was lower than that of found across the State, at 7% versus 14%, respectively.
- About one-half of the population in the North Coastal area was White alone, while 45% of the population in the North Inland area was of Hispanic or Latino origin.
- Viewing race by city, 74% of the population in Carlsbad and Valley Center were White alone and about one-half of the populations in Vista and Escondido were of Hispanic or Latino origin.
- Home to several Indian Reservations, Pauma Valley had 41% of its population identified as American Indian and Alaska Native alone.

- As across the State, 29% of the population in North San Diego County in 2016 spoke Spanish at home.
- The North Inland area had more Spanish-speaking households than the North Coastal area, at 36% versus 25%, respectively.
- One-half of the populations in the cities of Fallbrook, Vista and Escondido speak Spanish at home, while Spanish is only spoken at home by 5% in Carlsbad and less than 1% in Pauma Valley.

Head Start/Early Head Start Demographics

This section includes demographic information for Head Start and Early Head Start eligible children and families in North San Diego County, including estimated and projected numbers by age, racial and ethnic composition and income level.

Child Population

- In 2016, 4% (nearly 29,800) of the children in North San Diego County were between the ages of 0 to 2 years old, and 3% (about 19,000) were between 3 and 4 years old.
- 4% of the populations in the North Coastal and North Inland areas were 2 years old or younger, and 3% in each area were 3-4 years old.
- Compared to other cities in North San Diego County, Pauma Valley, at 12%, had the greatest portion of its population between 0 and 2 years-old.
- In each of the North San Diego County cities, 2-3% of the population was 3-4 years-old.

Births

- In 2013, there were over nearly 43,700 births in San Diego County, accounting for 9% of all the births across California.
- 41% of births in San Diego County in 2013, as compared to 30% statewide, were to White mothers.
- Another 41% of births in San Diego County were to Hispanic mothers, also slightly lower than the percentage of 48% across California.

- 46% of all births in 2012 across the Head Start/Early Head Start locations in North San Diego County were to Hispanic mothers.
- In the North Inland area 53% of all births were to Hispanic mothers, as compared to 42% in the North Coastal area.
- In Vista, Escondido, Pauma Valley and Fallbrook, one-half or more of mothers that gave birth in 2012 were Hispanic.
- In comparison, nearly two-thirds of births during that same time in Carlsbad were to White mothers and 11% were to Asian mothers.

- In 2012, nearly 7% of all births in North San Diego County were to mothers under 20 years of age.
- 8% of new mothers in the North Inland area and 6% of new mothers in the North Coastal area were under 20 years of age.
- At most, 13% of all births in Pauma Valley were to mothers under 20 years-old.
- In contrast, 2% of mothers in Carlsbad were under 20.

Poverty

- Across North San Diego County in 2016, 12% of the population had income in the past 12 months below the poverty level.
- 13% of the population in the North Inland area and 11% in the North Coastal area had been living in poverty a year prior to 2016.
- At most, nearly 20% of the population in Pauma Valley had income in the past 12 months below the poverty level, followed by 18% in Fallbrook.
- In comparison, only 5% of the population in Carlsbad was living below poverty.

- In 2016, 6% of families living in North San Diego County with income below the poverty level were collecting Social Security income and 8% were receiving Supplemental Security Income (SSI) and/or public assistance income.
- A similar percentage of families living below poverty in the North Coastal area and the North Inland area were receiving Social Security income, at 9% and 7%, respectively.

CHILD CARE

Child Care Facilities & Capacity

- In June 2016, the California Community Care Licensing Division reported that there were 99,741 child care slots among a total of 4,601 licensed child care centers and family day care homes across San Diego County.
- Although 74% of the licensed child care facilities in North San Diego County are family day care homes, these homes account for 33% of the child care spaces available throughout the County.
- The majority (79%) of the child care spaces at centers are for toddlers and preschoolers.

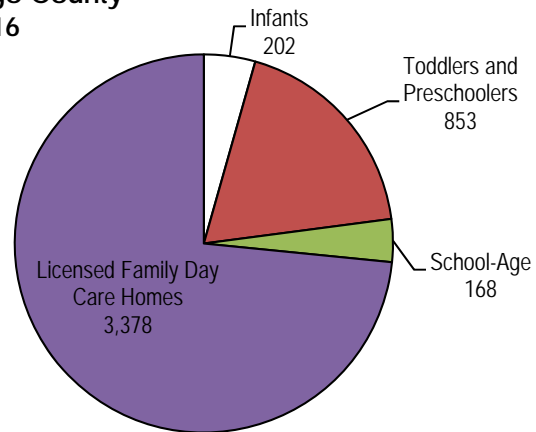
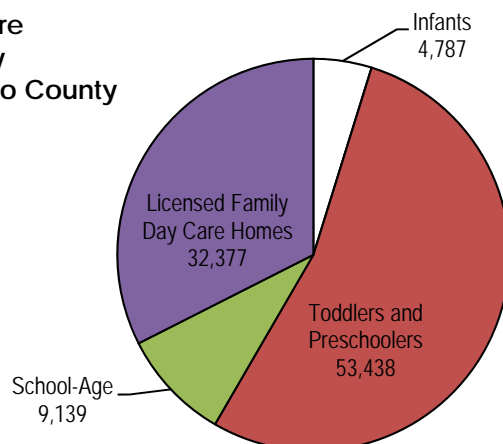

Child Care Supply

- In 2016, the California Child Care Resource and Referral Network reported that 39% of requests for child care in San Diego County were for children under 2 years of age.
- 42% of requests for child care in San Diego County were for children 2 to 5 years-old.
- With 65% of requests for child care in 2016 due to employment, it is not surprising that 79% or more of requests were for full-time child care.
- During this same time, 17% of child care requests in San Diego County was for evening, weekend or overnight care.

- In 2016 in San Diego County, both full-time and part-time slots were offered at 68% of licensed child care centers and 78% of licensed family child care homes.
- 13% of licensed child care centers and 21% of licensed family child care homes in San Diego County during this same year offered only full-time slots.
- Part-time slots were available at 19% of child care centers and only 1% of family child care homes.
- 32% of family child care homes, as compared to just 1% of child care centers, offered evening, weekend or overnight care.
- The average cost of child care in 2016 was higher at licensed child care centers as compared to family child care homes, with the difference being greater for full-time infant care than preschool care.

Child Care Need

Child care need was estimated looking at the number of children under 5 and the calculated percentage of parents in the labor force that have children 5 years old and younger. Subtracting out the current number of child care spaces available across San Diego County from the estimated number of children under 5 with working parents gives an estimation of the unmet need.

- Of the 213,567 children under 5 years old in San Diego County, an estimated 61% (or 128,764) have working parents.
- With an estimated 128,764 children under 5 likely needing child care and a total of 90,602 slots among licensed child care centers and family child care homes across San Diego County, potentially 30% (or 38,162) of children in need of child care do not have access to a child care space.

The estimated need for Head Start/Early Head Start Programs was computed based on the number of children under 5 in households with income below poverty and the calculated percentage of parents in the labor force that have children 5 years old and younger. Subtracting out the current number of spaces available through Head Start/Early Head Start from the estimated number of children under 5 years old living in poverty with parents in the labor force gives an estimation of the unmet need.

- Given that an estimated 66% of parents in North San Diego County with children 5 years old and younger are working, it is estimated that there are 5,845 children under 5 years old living in poverty that have parents in the labor force—children that are likely to be in need of some type of subsidized child care.
- With 5,845 children in North San Diego County likely eligible for a Head Start/Early Head Start program but 1,711 funded spaces across MAAC, FCCP homes and Partner agencies in North San Diego County, there is an estimated need for an additional 4,134 Head Start/Early Head Start program slots.
- Based on these calculations, it is estimated that 2,121 of additional Head Start/Early Head Start program slots are needed in the North Coastal area and 2,034 slots are needed in the North Inland area.
- Considering need by city, at most, about 3 out of 4 children most likely eligible for Head Start/Early Head Start in Escondido, San Marcos and Vista would not have an available spot.
- In contrast, there are enough Head Start/Early Head Start slots in Pauma Valley and Valley Center to cover the estimated need for such care in those cities.

DISABILITY

- Based on Special Education Local Plan Area (SELPA) data, in 2016, 134 children 0-2 years old and 1,272 children 3-4 years old in North San Diego County were enrolled in Special Education.
- The majority (123 or 92%) of the 0-2 year-olds enrolled in Special Education in North San Diego County in December of 2016 were diagnosed some type of health impairment.
- During this same period, 75% (949 of 1,272) of 3-4 year-olds enrolled in Special Education in North San Diego County had a diagnosed speech or language impairment, followed by 19% (239 of 1,272) diagnosed as autistic.

HEALTH

- According to CH1LDREN NOW's 2016-17 California County Scorecard, 90% of children in San Diego County had health insurance for the entire year, similar to the average percentage across all 57 California counties.
- Among Latino children in San Diego County, 83% reported having health insurance for a full year, which was relatively lower than the percentages for other ethnic groups in the County but still high nonetheless.
- In 2016-17, 93% of children in San Diego County had a usual source of health care.
- 37% of asthmatic children in San Diego County have been given an asthma management plan, which is higher than the average of 24% across all the counties in the State.
- 38% of low-income young children, ages 0-3 years old in San Diego County have visited a dentist in the last year, which is 6% above the average across all California counties.

Financial Assistance

- In 2016, about 8% of all households in North San Diego County were receiving food stamps.
- 10% of the households in the North Inland area, as compared to 6% in the North Coastal area, were part of the food stamp program.

- The number of homeless families and individuals in those families dropped 2% and 9%, respectively, from last year's count.
- Among the homeless families, there were 976 children under 18, and 17% of those children were unsheltered.
- There were 1,081 unaccompanied Transitional Age Youth (TAY)* in San Diego County in 2017, an increase of 58% over the prior homeless youth count.
- In addition, 78% of the unaccompanied TAY were unsheltered.
- In 2017 there were 68 unaccompanied minors, of which 60% were unsheltered.
- On a positive note, the number of unaccompanied minors decreased 53% from the prior count.

- In contrast, 54% of enrolled children in Pauma Valley and 47% in Carlsbad are 4 years old and soon to be aging out of Head Start.

- The majority of children in each of the North San Diego County cities were primarily eligible for a Head Start/Early Head Start program because their household income was below 100% of the federal poverty line.
- In Oceanside, the primary type of eligibility for 11% of Head Start/Early Head Start enrollees was receipt of public assistance such as TANF or SSI.
- As a foster child, 5% of children in Fallbrook were eligible for Head Start/Early Head Start, while 11% of children in San Marcos were eligible because of their homeless status.

- I think we need a partnership with afterschool care programs that can provide child care after 5pm for working parents and/or for those who have other children not in Head Start
- I would like to see faster outcomes for helping families
- In our community we need parents to be more aware that their children need them to be involve in school
- In the area of Fallbrook we serve low income families that do not have transportation
- Keep finding additional and/or new ways to encourage family involvement to promote a sense of ownership of the program
